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The Ornithologist Corner The American Black Duck




The American Black Duck is a medium-sized dabbling duck with a dark charcoal body. Dabbling is a way of feeding that lets the duck tip forward and reach deeply into the water without actually diving.

Look for white wing linings when they fly (this contrast gives a unique appearance) and an olive or greenish bill. The males and females are very similar; the variations being mainly with the bills - the male has a yellowish bill while the female's bill is dull gray with marks in the upper mandible.

The black duck has bred with the Mallards so much that the pure American Black Ducks numbers are decreasing.

The black duck has a nasal, quacking call - sounding like "*whap-whap*, *whap-whap*".

See if you can tell if you have a American Black Duck or a Mallard going "Bottoms Up"!



Ellie's Corner

"To me it is important not to live in a throwaway society...that you respect what came before." Eleanor Gesensway.

The banks of the Rancocas Creek has in its residents a remarkable membership of truly talented and interesting persons. Please enjoy another excerpt from Ellie's book - <u>"An Oral History Project: Life Along the North Branch of the Rancocas Creek between Mount Holly and Smithville, New Jersey"</u>.

Matthew Palma lived along the Rancocas almost all his life. His 'first memories of the creek go back to 1933 or 1934". He remembers, at 6 or 7 years old "going across the little footbridge to the boathouse (Kate's Island Boathouse) when it was only 2 ft wide. He enjoyed fishing growing up.

Mr. Palma spoke of the 'crowd from Philadelphia General Hospital...that would rent anywhere from 2 to 5 canoes" when their shifts were done - at night! "They tipped one canoe over and (he) charged them \$7...they tipped another and (he) charged them 2 more dollars. After that, they didn't tip any more canoes over!"

Mr. Palma loved to canoe, "of course, there's no motor-powered boats allowed on the creek, but I'm even against these

electric motors on the canoes even though they're harmless. Memorial Day starts the season on the creek for the city people, but the best canoeing is ... September... and (October). In the wintertime, you can look across the banks and see right straight through the woods".

Franklin's had a rental as well as Hack's. "Hack's canoes were all olive green and grey. But all Franklin's boats were decorated". "We had the 'Duck' boat...with a pair of wood ducks painted on the bow on either side... there was also ... 'Mermaid' canoe, 'Pond Lily', 'Morning Glory', 'Wildfire', 'Cardinal' and others".


There was a canoe carnival in Mount Holly every year at Mill Dam. "...it was beautiful the way they used to decorate the canoes. Sometimes they would hook them up in tandem, two together, and they had floats".

"It seems to me one of the first meetings the Rancocas Creek Association ever held was held in the boathouse years and years ago. I remember Franklin (Kates) saying, 'I don't want none of you kids down here tonight because I'm having an important meeting".

Mr. Palma shared our sentiments about the beauty of our neighborhood - 'The reason I spent a lot of time down here is that it is just as pretty here in the winter as it is in the spring and the summer. You come down here and it's so quiet. You see things. You can see a rabbit running around or a squirrel or a pheasant. I used to walk all around the tract here and then go up to Paducah and walk all around and come back. I'd go down the railroad tracks and come back. There was nobody down here then".

Best of wishes to *Betty Freni* as she continues to rebuild after the stormy summer. A very warm thank you has been




The RCA has a long history. - from 1934! It was originally a "camper's association", formed by families summering along the creek.
